

### ◆ **What is a home group?**

### ◆ **What is it for?**

To enable the members of the small group to get to know and care for one another, and help each other grow in the Christian life. The groups are really appreciated by long-standing and new members alike.

### ◆ **What happens at a home group?**

Each group develops its own particular style of sharing and learning together, drawing on the ingredients of worship, prayer, Bible focussed study/discussion, and maybe a "cuppa". Leading is shared among those members of the group who feel happy to do so, and the subject may be of their own choosing or part of a prearranged series. Meetings typically last 1½ to 2 hours.

## Guide Dog Pup Updates...

As most of you will already know we now have another Guide Dog puppy, our fourth, called Hooch (we don't name them). Hooch at the time of the magazine being published will be 5 months old and he is a German Shepherd Dog and is getting very big.

Hooch came as a surprise to us just after Christmas and we entered the challenge with some trepidation. We had been told a lot of different things about training German Shepherds and we were very wary of what we had let ourselves in for.

Roy had told our Supervisor that we did not want to have another puppy until the Spring as we had some projects in the garden to finish and we also wanted a break. Roy told her that he would take one on only if it was a German Shepherd and as these are in the minority we thought we would stand a good chance of having a long time in between dogs, but we were wrong!

Hooch from the day he arrived has been a pleasure to have. We have not had the sleepless nights we had with the others and his toileting has been excellent. He loves going out, although he is not very keen on going in the car and as many have heard, enjoys joining in with the singing in the morning service (only on occasions). He has his routine in the evening before going to bed and unless his hot water bottle (doggie one) is in his bed he gets quite upset and lets you know about it and if you put it in the wrong way round he will moan until you put it right. Apparently German Shepherds are always very vocal, so you definitely know that you have got one in the house, but he doesn't bark when anyone comes to the door. He, like all of the dogs, enjoys a cuddle and being made a fuss of.

We have also heard that Fennel (our first pup) has had her second litter of puppies, four girls and four boys. Five are golden and three black and they are all being sent to Forfar in Scotland to train as Guide Dogs for people who have Epilepsy/Guiding and Diabetes/Guiding as was her previous littler, except for Badger.

Adam is doing very well with his new owner and is proving to be an excellent Guide Dog and companion and is loved very much by his owner.

Badger is still undertaking his advanced training in Maidstone, Kent and has not yet been matched with a blind person, although he is doing very well. Hopefully we will hear shortly that he has passed and we will eventually get a picture of him in harness and a certificate. We went to see him just after Christmas and he was pleased to see us and wanted to come home with us, which was upsetting. Hopefully he will find a lovely new home and owner soon.

That is all the news to date but I would just like to say thank you again for all your help and prayers for these remarkable dogs.

## **Thank you, Lord, for our local hospices**

That is my heartfelt prayer and some of you will share it as a result of your own experience. In our area we are very fortunate in having such a comprehensive hospice network, providing support for those with life limiting or threatening illnesses and also end of life care. Let me briefly explain their roles.

Under the statement of purpose "Total care when time is precious" the Hospice of St Francis in Northchurch offers in-patient facilities for compassionate respite and end of life care. In a lovely modern building set in beautiful grounds the very best professional services are available, with the emphasis on patient comfort and pain control. In addition activities are offered for support and counselling for day visitors.

Rennie Grove Hospice Care was formed by the amalgamation of two organisations – The Iain Rennie Hospice at Home service, and the Grove House Day Hospice. Their work is summed up in the words "Care based around you".

The Hospice at Home service provides 24/7 support in Herts and Bucks for patients in their own homes, and often makes it possible for those who wish to spend their last days at home to do so. Regular visits are made by specialist nurses who can provide advice on medication and symptom control as well as carry out medical procedures such as installing a syringe driver or catheter. In addition there is round the clock telephone access for advice and help, with out of hours visits if necessary.

Grove House provides a range of services for those able to visit the purpose designed, welcoming centre in the grounds of St Albans City Hospital. Here care, advice, information and support are available ranging from a drop-in service on Tuesdays to a full day of TLC on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. On offer are a regular health assessment, relaxation exercises, complimentary therapies, a discussion group, three course lunch, arts and crafts, quizzes and visiting speakers. As well as the formal activities, there is the help and encouragement that comes through meeting with other patients. It's

very much like an extended family. And the care is not confined to the patients - support is also available for family members and carers.

All the services provided by the hospices are free of charge to the users. A small proportion, typically 15%, of the considerable running costs, is met by the government. The rest has to be found by an extensive range of fundraising activities and enterprises such as local charity shops. Our own Penny Crosswell, is a Community Fundraising Manager for Rennie Grove.

My enthusiasm for their work arises from the benefit that I have personally experienced – and Dilys too when she was ill. I do hope you will stop by the display and literature which will be on show in the church during May and June; also look out for the lovely greetings cards handmade by Karen and Rachel Southwood and sold in aid of Rennie Grove. Maybe there's something YOU could do to support our wonderful hospices.

***Is anything too hard for the Lord? Genesis 18:14***

***From the lips of children and infants you have ordained praise.  
Psalm 8:2***

Although the Russian government no longer persecutes Christians for their faith, some believers still suffer for confessing Jesus Christ. A twelve year old boy experienced the following:-

“I heard about church meetings on Karl Marx street and went there because I wanted to know more about God. When I was told that Jesus loves children as well I asked Him to love me too. When I told my mother, she was very upset and angry. She told me that God does not exist. I was beaten every time I went to church. But I still went. Then one day my mother decided to join me so that she could talk to the pastor and tell him not to let me go to church any more. But I took her on a Sunday so she would have to listen to his preaching first. As she sat there, something happened, she started to cry uncontrollably. She realised her need for God and asked the pastor to pray for her. Now we go to church together.”

***It was said among the nations the Lord has done great things for them. Psalm 126:2+3***

Some time ago whilst on Bible delivery work, we went to visit a pastor we had never met before. We had no idea of the church he belonged to, his age, or other details of his circumstance other than a need for a study Bible. We had been given his name and address, in case we thought it of the Lord to try and visit when we were in the area and had safely finished other deliveries. We arrived at the address where

the door was opened by a woman. It turned out that her husband, the pastor was now deceased.

After fellowship and before we left we gave her the Study Bible we had brought for her husband. She was delighted as she had never been visited by foreigners before but had been praying for a study Bible. She said "Today God has answered my prayer and released me from my prison of loneliness. He sent you and gave me the greatest gift I have prayed for. Thank you for coming". We left the woman filled with joy. We were there too late, and yet on time.

### **Tales of 'donkey carrying bread for Jesus'**

We had received our instructions telling us where to meet our contact. We had no idea who he was, what he looked like, young or old. We didn't know how he would come or which direction he would come from. We had done this kind of thing before so we had various thoughts, would it be someone we had met before but whose name we did not know? But standing here at the entrance to the building as the appointed time approached we were anxious as we were not on our own. The rain was heavy and so many people had sought to shelter in the large doorway. Taxis and cars were coming and going.

We were praying under our breath and constantly looking to see who was our likely contact. Would the plan have to be aborted because of all the people? Then a miracle! The rain stopped and most of the crowd vanished. A minute later a taxi pulled up spot on time. The driver got out, came to us, picked up bags and we knew this was him. The car boot was opened, bags put in and with a quick smile and thanks he was off. We went off down the road and into the crowd wondering at the timing of the Lord.

The following story is condensed from 'The Cry of our Brothers' by Esther Davenport.

The morning was cold and dark in the wee small hours as the two of us set out to meet the rest of our group of six, who were staying in different hotels. We were from three different nations, cultures, age and backgrounds, in this country far from home but we had a common cause.

With the familiar heavy back-backs strapped to our backs and pulling equally heavy suitcases we walked at a steady pace, not rushing. We did not talk but walked silently not want to draw attention to ourselves at this hour of the morning... After a while we reached our landmark and crossed the road to a block of flats, grey and ugly. A security guard with a gun slung over his shoulder suddenly rounded the building. He was looking at us but we did not give eye contact but prayed quietly under our breath. He turned and walked into the doorway. We reached the cover of the roadside trees and waited with the rest of the group. We stood in silence, praying constantly as streaks of dawn light broke through the trees. We trusted the Lord and had to keep our eyes focused on Him and not think “what if the security guard followed us? Phoned the Public Security Bureau? Our brothers have been stopped at a checkpoint?”

Then from our leader a whispered “I think they are coming”. We could hear the sound of an engine driving slowly. And then through the gloom we could see them. Our leader stepped out of the shadows. The truck came to a halt and our leader said “it’s them”. Two men jumped out and rushed to the rear of the truck quickly lowering the tailgate. We quickly moved to the rear of the truck as hands reached down to pick up the cases, others took the loads from our backs and our loads vanished into the back of the truck with a sense of urgency..Two clicks and the rattle of chains and the tailgate is quickly back in place. A hand grabs mine, I look at a beaming face and hear “Thank you, God blesses you” from one and then another brother, and we respond “bless you”. They raise a hand in salute: turn, jump back into the truck where the engine is still running. Into gear, revved the engine and pulled off down the road. One of our number goes with them to claim the luggage as his if stopped. It is all over in seconds. We retreat to the trees to catch our breath and wonder “did that really happen?”

Our leader says “Well that’s it, breakfast time!” We make our way to where we are to breakfast praising the Father and praying for the “bread” to arrive safe

**Help.** Your help is needed in prayer. In the giving up of your holiday time to carry loads, in the giving of your money. Different organisations that support our brothers and sisters overseas work in

different ways but they all have one thing in common - To serve the Lord and "Give a cup of cold water" to those in need. To do this they need money – your money, time – your time. I am not going to go down the old prosperity gospel teaching of 'give and it will be given to you' 'plant seeds so you will get more back' No, I am asking you to bless our brothers and sisters not out of your spare cash/ time but to be like the 'widow with her two small coins'. To expect no reward other than your Father in heaven to see and say 'well done good and faithful servant'. . What you give may provide a Bible, feed some one, and enable them to visit a relative in prison, pay the fees of someone facing a blasphemy charge. If you decide to travel you will have the joy of paying your own costs. Being with others who know the Lord but are of a different culture age and background. You may carry heavy loads (supernaturally light when necessary) sleep in an uncomfortable bed in the same room as someone who snores, but hey, what of our brothers in prison? You will learn how to obey instructions and punctuality. You will know you have made a difference.

I can tell you from experience that there are many ways to travel in many different nations. Your walk with the Lord will be joy and you will know Him near you as you carry out His purposes. I have worked for four different organisations in the business of helping our wider family but as a Release representative I am appealing to you to please, please give, the work can not continue without sacrificial giving and the Lord is speaking to you now. Every little helps. All you have to do is skip one meal and give the cost and use the time to pray and seek the Lord for our family.

Have you ever sung 'Hear I am Lord, send me'? I can tell you that you will never be the same again as you go and are used to bless your family and are blessed by them as you choose to go as a 'donkey' or simply visit and take the news that folk know of their plight and are standing with them in prayer.
