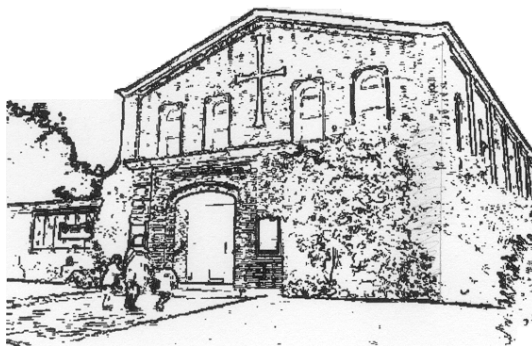

The Minister's message

Dear All,

Recently I started our Small Group's meeting (based on Urban Saints energise material) by saying "The road to hell is paved with good intentions." And reading from Matthew 7: 13-14: -

The narrow and wide gates (Matt. 7:13-14)

"13 Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. 14 But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life and only a few find it." (NIV)

Being and Doing (Matt. 7:13-14)

"Don't look for shortcuts to God. The market is flooded with sure-fire, easy-going formulas for a successful life that can be practiced in your spare time. Don't fall for that stuff, even though crowds of people do. The way to life—to God!—is vigorous and requires total attention." (The Message)

In this passage Jesus warns his followers that it is easy to miss Eternal Life. The way to heaven is hard, it requires us to make sacrifices in order to obey God and put him first. There are, Jesus warns, few that find it.

This is an uncomfortable, distressing and difficult teaching. I am used to talking about God's love, His grace and His desire that everyone should be saved: but we know from our own experience that people are good at finding excuses why they don't need God, or why they haven't got time to think about it just now. Indeed, later on in Matthew's gospel Jesus tells the story of the great feast – and the excuses that people made for not attending it.

What is on the "wide road"? All sorts of things! Major sin, of course; materialism; too much emphasis on wealth and position. But there are also small things – peer pressure; not wanting to be "different"; laziness; apathy; following the crowd rather than thinking about what you really believe.

What is on the narrow path? Jesus! Finding time to read the Bible and pray; to love your neighbour; to follow God; denying yourself to serve other people; financial giving to support the work of the Kingdom and to do what God has asked of you.

BADGER

Well, it's that time again, another year and another Guide Dog puppy.

For all those that don't know, Badger is our third Guide Dog puppy who has just left us and gone on to advanced training. Badger has gone to Redbridge to the main Guide Dog Training Centre for the south-east. He will be there for the next few months in kennels with two other dogs, while he is waiting to be assessed on his capabilities. He will then go on to do his advanced training and then eventually if all goes well will be placed with his blind person sometime in the New Year.

Most of you at St. George's have seen Badger on most Sundays and know most of what he has done but for those who don't I will tell you a little bit about him.

We collected Badger in August of 2012 from Leamington Spa the Guide Dog's National Breeding Station: he was just 7 weeks old. His mother Fennel was our first Guide Dog pup, who was chosen by Guide Dogs to be a mum.

We have taken Badger everywhere, shopping in Sainsbury's, where on his first visit he slept all the way round in the shopping trolley, on buses, trains, he has been to a wedding, four funerals, a christening, first communion, restaurants, parties, hospital and doctor's and many more places, the list is endless. He has also been to three Warner's holidays, one on the Isle of Wight where he enjoyed the ferry ride.

Part of the work that we do is to go into schools (infant, junior and senior) and tell the children and their teachers and sometimes parents about Guide Dogs and what we do as puppy walkers and our friend Sarah brings her Guide Dog Yardley along and explains what it is like to be blind. Badger has been to Cavendish School where he was confronted by a large number of 12 year olds all very eager to fuss him as well as Mark who I think was the worst. He has been to Southill School, St. John's Ambulance, Salvation Army, Brownies groups and Wednesday Welcome.

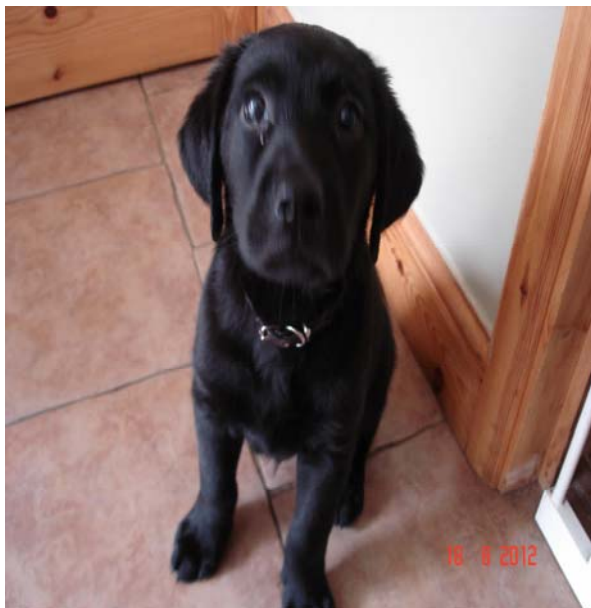
Back last October we had the privilege of being asked by Guide Dogs to go to Clarence House to meet the Duchess of Cornwall and Kimberley Walsh (Girls Aloud) as part of the Diamond Award for Volunteering for the over 60's. It was a wonderful day with Badger being photographed with the Duchess and Kimberley and even having his picture on television. He

behaved impeccably and was a great hit with the Duchess who loves dogs.

Now the time has come and when this article comes out we will be without a dog and the house will feel very empty, but Guide Dogs are very clever and I suspect they will not let us get away with too long a gap before they come knocking with a new little pup for us to train, although we hope we can get our patio finished before this happens.

Thank you all for your prayers and support it is good to have a family of people around backing you up and giving you encouragement.

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) is an award winning debt counselling charity. It was founded in Bradford by John Kirkby in 1996 when, in his job as a financial adviser, he saw the misery and poverty that afflicted people in debt. These people felt a hopelessness from which there seemed to be no escape. Other debt organisations charged for sorting out a way of budgeting, and payday loans only increased the debt in the long run.

A quote from Kevin of Halifax illuminates this point:

“Debt was like an illness with no cure. We were robbing Peter to pay Paul but it just wasn’t working. CAP have lifted the load from our shoulders and now we are debt free”.

John Kirkby believed God was calling him to give up his career in finance to help these people.

CAP’s headquarters are still in Bradford but there is a growing network of centres throughout the UK, one of which is in Hemel Hempstead. It is a strong Christian organisation but helps anyone regardless of religious beliefs. The service is completely free, although donations are welcome. Families who have recovered from debt often give donations to help other families recover from the situation in which they once found themselves. CAP has also built a sound reputation with the financial services industry, which means they can negotiate with service providers, councils, landlords etc. to work out fair repayments based on what the client can afford. They know it is better to have a slow repayment of debt than none at all, with the likely expense of taking the debtor to court.

This is how CAP works:

After the prospective client has made contact, a CAP debt coach and support worker from the local centre will visit them in their own home and take details of all income and expenditure.

A realistic budget is worked out at CAP headquarters prioritising essential bills, negotiating with creditors and stopping unfair charges where possible. The debt coach then returns to the client to explain the budget and the payments that need to be made. In severe situations it may be necessary to look at different solutions like bankruptcy or a debt relief order. CAP can help with the forms or even court attendance.

A CAP account is then set up which acts as a simple bank account. A weekly or monthly payment is made into this by the client and CAP distributes the necessary payments. This account will be used to pay bills and debt repayments until the client is debt free.

Contacting CAP is the first step on a long road for those in debt. While there is relief at seeing light at the end of the tunnel, continuously maintaining a tight budget can be wearing and demoralising.

Since opening in October 2006, in partnership with New Horizons Christian Fellowship, the local CAP network has helped 350 families; in 2012 24 people in Hemel became debt free and 6 clients made a first time commitment to Christ. Not only is it great action, but CAP also focuses on sharing the good news of Jesus Christ, bringing hope into the home and praying for clients and sharing testimonies.

CAP is looking for volunteers who feel able to train as debt coaches but also befrienders who can give support to families or individuals in the long haul to become free of debt.

CAP also runs personal money management courses, so whether or not you've got money worries, this three session course could be really useful in helping you to budget effectively. If you're interested in going on a money management course, please speak to one of the elders.

For five days (July 29th to August 2nd) children from ages 5 to 11 were at St George's Space Academy, a space-themed holiday club exploring the outer reaches of space and the story of Daniel. The children were divided into teams – Mercury, Venus, Pluto, Neptune, Jupiter and Earth. Every day there were challenges, supanova exercises, team races, cosmic crafts, stellar songs and stories to help them discover how God was faithful to Daniel and his friends as they tried to live for him in a foreign land; a land that was so different that it was like being on another planet.

In addition, the children journeyed to space, to out-of-this-world places on board the starship, S.S. St. George's with Captain Janewade and her crew in the drama *A Final Frontier*.

For the first four days, the team scores between Mercury and Venus were very close but on the last day Mercury eclipsed Venus with their superior memory-verse memorising skills to win the coveted top prize in the 5-7s galaxy. So many prayer needs – where and how do we start?

There is much persecution of people called ‘Christians’ across the world, but are they all born again, bible believing Christians? We live in England, a Christian country but we are not all Christians. The Christian being persecuted may simply have been born Christian; examples being the Joseph and Yohanabad colonies in Lahore, Pakistan. They have been attacked and homes burnt but many do not know the Lord from having been ‘born again’ and turning to a new life in Christ, they were ‘born’ Christians and as a result have no peace or strength in the inner man to be overcome.

In some countries trouble comes for people when they leave the religion they are born into and turn from it to follow Christ i.e. in India from Hindus, in Iran on turning from Islam. In China and North Korea trouble for believers comes from the state officials.

There are many whose faith has begun or grown under persecution and torture, indeed for many witnesses to the persecution, the road to salvation begins when they see something in the life of a believer that is missing from their own. Alex Buchan in “Quotes to Live By” tells the story of an old Chinese lady who was beaten every day by the Red Guards. Only on his 15th visit did she admit to him how awful it had been, of how she had longed for death. After she was free she had found that many who had witnessed her suffering came sneaking to her home to ask her about Jesus and for Bibles.

Just as we are all individuals with our own walks with the Lord and diverse daily lives so the lives of our brothers and sisters are different. We need to seek the Lord for each as an individual. It seems that we should be following the teaching of Jesus as the writers of the letters did and be praying for and about salvation, forgiveness, confession of sin, repentance and being overcomes. Jesus tells us not to worry about the needs of daily life, so let us pray that our family can do that and trust the Lord. They need our help to do this otherwise we would not have been told to pray for them! Be obedient.

In his book 'If You Will Ask', Oswald Chambers says "Only when a man flounders beyond any grip of himself and cannot understand things does he really pray" *and* "When a man is in real distress he prays without reasoning. He does not think things out, he simply blurts it out. "Then they cried out to the Lord in their trouble, and He saved them of their distresses" (Psalm 107:13). Lord please teach us to pray and intercede for our brothers.

Each month I receive items for pray from several organisations. I do not always pray according to the organisations request but try to pray as led by the Lord. This is often a deliberate choice as I may not think the request is in line with bible teaching. An example of this may be a request to 'pray to' or 'ask' the Holy Spirit for something. I can only find instruction to pray to the Father, never the Holy Spirit. I also have difficulty with requests to ask God to get officials to do such-and-such, so I prefer to seek the Lord for the salvation of individuals whether they are suffering or in a position of authority.

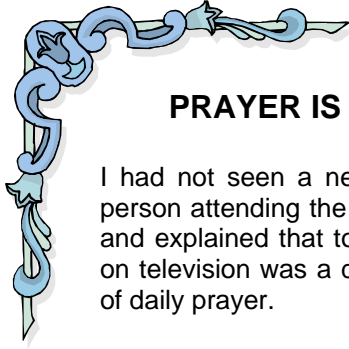

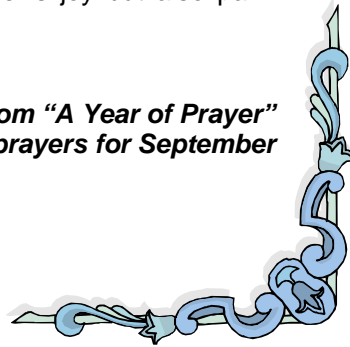
He looked surprised.

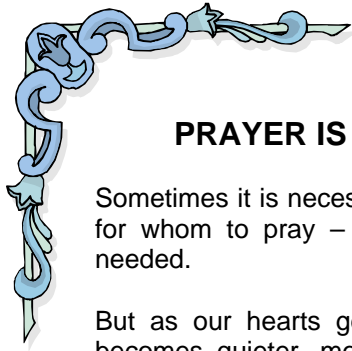

Our action, if it is truly to be a sharing in God's action, will flow from our inner being, who we are. That which moves me to pray, that which engages my imagination and my will, and that to which I am drawn and which utilises my gifts will be an indication to me of how I can best act.

This kind of action is not easy; there is joy but also pain. This too is prayer.

PRAYER IS FOR AND WITH OTHERS

Sometimes it is necessary and good to have a list of people for whom to pray – a reminder that we have to hand if needed.

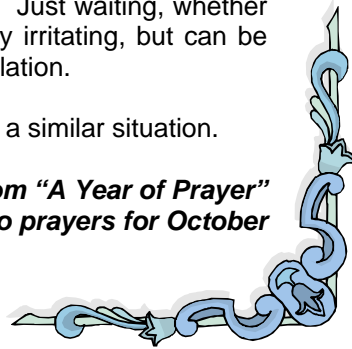
But as our hearts get stretched, as prayer is deepened, becomes quieter, more contemplative, it may be that our deepest prayers for others are those least articulated. Our concern, our love and our awareness of others, our openness to them, is in itself prayer.

There is, however, a lot to be gained from taking time to sit quietly on one's own or with others and let this awareness grow. To listen in the silence; to remember, smile, perhaps cry. Spoken prayers may come, if not, that is all right.

I have found too that some of the times when I have sensed a kind of solidarity in prayer for, in and with others have been odd moments at a bus stop or in a queue. This has come from using the time to become aware of where I am and of those around me, and then seeing what associations arise and letting prayer flow from that. Just waiting, whether in a car or on foot, can be immensely irritating, but can be turned into an opportunity for contemplation.

Try it the next time you find yourself in a similar situation.
